

Accelerated Subtyping of Influenza A in Hospitalized Patients: Guidance for Clinicians and Laboratories in Arkansas

Summary

Clinicians and laboratories in Arkansas are encouraged to test for influenza in patients with suspected influenza and, going forward, expedite the subtyping of influenza A-positive specimens from hospitalized patients with influenza A, particularly those in an intensive care unit (ICU).

Key Recommendations

- Subtype influenza A-positive specimens from hospitalized patients, as soon as possible and within 24 hours of obtaining the result.
 - o If influenza A subtyping IS available at the hospital or clinical laboratory:
 - Send all unsubtypeable influenza A specimens [i.e., negative for A(H1) and A(H3)], regardless of hospitalization status, to the Arkansas State Public Health Laboratory (SPHL).
 - o If influenza A virus subtyping IS NOT available at the hospital or clinical laboratory:
 - Send specimens that are positive for influenza A from hospitalized patients to the SPHL.
 - Alternatively, specimens can be sent to a commercial clinical laboratory.
 - If the results indicate unsubtypeable influenza A [i.e., negative for A(H1) and A(H3)], send remaining specimen to the SPHL.
 - o Specimen collection and submission instructions are available on the SPHL website.
 - Laboratories should use the <u>ADH Laboratory Web Portal</u> to order the influenza surveillance test.
 - Do not batch specimens for consolidated or bulk shipment to the SPHL if that would result in shipping delays for any such specimen.
 - Please report influenza hospitalizations and deaths within 24 hours through the <u>ADH Influenza</u>
 Surveillance Website.
- Subtyping is also especially important in people who have a history of <u>relevant exposure</u> to animals infected or possibly infected with avian influenza A(H5N1) viruses, regardless of hospitalization status.
 - Due to low or unknown sensitivity, negative results from antigen detection tests, including rapid influenza diagnostic tests, do NOT exclude influenza A(H5N1) infection in symptomatic patients.
 - Additional guidance related to influenza A(H5N1) <u>testing</u>, <u>treatment</u>, <u>infection control</u>, and prevention is available.
