

Sale of Epinephrine to schools, restaurants, camps, etc.:

Arkansas Code Title 20, Subtitle 2, Chapter 13, Subchapter 4 – Insect Sting and Other Allergic Reactions Emergency Treatment Act - permits entities such as schools, restaurants, and camps to possess epinephrine for administration treatment to persons with severe adverse reactions to insect stings and other allergic reactions. A prescriber must issue an epinephrine certificate to a properly trained individual. The certificate may be obtained from the Department of Health and the link is listed below.

A pharmacist may transfer epinephrine to the certificate holder based on an invoice.

Sale of albuterol to schools:

Act 851 of 2019 permits the sale of albuterol to schools to be administered by trained personnel who hold a certificate issued by a licensed physician. The personnel must be trained in the administration of albuterol prior to obtaining the certificate and possession of albuterol. The Health Dept requires personnel to obtain training via a nationally accredited program. More information can be obtained by contacting:
